Teachers will use the data to identify next learning steps for each child.• Teachers will regularly participate in quality targeted PLD to ensure they are at the forefront of teaching pedagogy and practice.• Teaching programmes will be implemented that are student needs based, engaging, relevant and encompassing a wide range of contexts and learning opportunities.• The refreshed curriculum will continue to be implemented.• Teachers will provide frameworks for children to develop their critical thinking skills in a wide range of situations.• Teachers will use He reo tupu..He reo ora to continue to develop their te reo Māori competency.• Students and teachers will use the Te Reo Māori Club resource to develop Te Reo Māori competency.

Class, syndicate or schoolwide opportunities will occur to acknowledge, celebrate and value these cultures. • We will continue to use the Cool Schools peer mediation programme. • Principles developed from the PB4L programme will continue being implemented and followed. • Learning to Fly...Ka rere te manu descriptors will be promoted and embedded into practice. • Opportunities for the Treaty of Waitangi to be weaved into what we do will be explored. • The Niho Taniwha resource will be unpacked, examined and concepts and practice implemented where applicable. Ka Hikitia resource will be re-visited. • To continue monthly walk arounds the school to identify any potential hazards. Any identified hazards will then be addressed and/or removed. • Maintenance of school facilities including the playgrounds will be kept up to date.

These include bedtime stories, flower show, great bake off, Easter Bonnet parade, Matariki evening and meet the teacher evenings• Student consultation will occur to gather student voice on identified/selected areas.• Regular reviews of our communication methods will occur to look for opportunities to improve in this area.
